

#### **BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTION**

Two seats, one for a three-year term beginning July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2023 and one for a one-year unexpired term beginning June 9, 2020 through June 30, 2021. The person with the highest votes occupies the three-year term. The next highest vote getter occupies the one-year unexpired term.

#### **Dear Briarcliff UFSD Families:**

These last several months have been difficult for kids, families and our schools. Yet, despite the challenges, the Briarcliff school community remains strong and united and, perhaps, more resolute in its desire to provide a high-quality education for all students. This is why we remain optimistic about the future of our schools and are excited about the opportunities that await our students in the fall. In collaboration with the Board of Education, the District's leadership team has developed a budget plan that reflects current economic realities, and aligns with the values and aspirations of our school community. The proposed budget would allow the District to preserve our educational programs, enhance our responsiveness to students' social and emotional needs, address critical security and facilities needs, and provide the financial flexibility necessary for the District to respond to further potential reductions in state aid and disruption to other forms of District revenue.

The Briarcliff schools continue to garner state and national recognition. This is because our faculty and staff work diligently to ensure success in the classroom while preparing students for the world outside our school walls. Success inside and out of school requires that students become creative in their thinking, can solve problems, are equipped to work collaboratively, and are able to persevere in pursuit of their objectives. At the same time, we are mindful that success comes more easily to those who possess confidence and a love of learning. This is why the District provides a broad and engaging array of educational activities and why we work so hard to ensure that we provide school environments that are warm, supportive and joyful places to learn and to grow.

The Briarcliff Manor School District has a long-established tradition of excellence. The proposed budget would ensure that our students continue to be engaged, challenged, supported and prepared to meet the challenges of the 21st century. Working closely with our building principals to address the goals and priorities of each of the three schools and while maintaining our overarching district philosophy, the Board of Education is presenting a budget that provides for:

- Continued implementation of the new writing program at the elementary school.
- New engaging reading materials and expanded classroom libraries at the elementary school.
- Bolstered coordination of the high school's well-regarded Science Research Program.
- Increased social and emotional support for middle and high school students.
- Implementation of critical safety and security upgrades at all three schools.
- Maintenance, repair and replacement of important infrastructure and facility items.
- Updated furniture for several elementary, middle and high school classrooms.

Working below the New York State mandated tax levy limit, the Board of Education has adopted a budget of \$53,381,866 which represents an increase of 1.31%. Therefore, this budget requires a simple majority vote to pass on June 9th.

In addition to the information provided in this newsletter, the District has created a more detailed Budget Book for your perusal. This resource represents the District's commitment to working collaboratively with the Board of Education, the community, and staff in developing the proposed school budget. 



- Eighth graders went on a trip to Ellis Island as part of their study of Gilded Age immigration. Seventh graders toured Philadelphia, visiting historic sites that correlated with their social studies curriculum. Sixth grade students explored the Mexican customs related to Dia de los Muertos by attending a screening of the film Coco and having lunch at a local Mexican restaurant.
- The Social and Emotional Learning Committee was created to guide the Middle School through an exploration of Social-Emotional

- Learning. The committee determined themes for each month and planned to implement some school-wide lessons.
- Students participated in International Day activities, including a SEL lesson on social awareness, workshops to reflect other cultures and a foreign film festival.







## **Pivoting to Distance Learning**

During the unprecedented time of the government shutdown we found ourselves in a surprisingly good position to make the switch to distance learning. Briarcliff is the only district in Westchester County where every student, from kindergarten to 12th grade, has a school-issued iPad or laptop.

"This enabled us to 'hit the ground running' with distance learning and not waste valuable time," said district Superintendent Dr. James Kaishian. "Kudos to teachers and staff who quickly shifted their practice to virtual instruction." He added. "Their creativity and determination have been impressive and their care and professionalism greatly appreciated.

## Out of Sight is Not out of Mind at Todd Elementary ENL Class

Students who are learning English as a New Language have their own set of challenges during the school year. In a distance learning situation those challenges can be even greater. Not to worry: Todd Elementary ENL teacher LeeLee Wong can help! She shared some tips and tricks to teaching students virtually.

In a recent lesson, second grade students worked on filling out a Venn diagram to learn how alligators and crocodiles are alike and different to help them prepare to write a short comparison paragraph. According to Ms. Wong, she did not need to make many adjustments when converting to teaching virtually.

"I stayed true to my teaching style but increased my connectivity with students through cuing and balancing participation; the resources are abundant for virtual teaching and learning and there are many online resources."

Most students at Todd are learning in small groups of fewer than five participants. There are some challenges but some benefits as well. "There are fewer interruptions. There are no bathroom or water breaks, and other interruptions that typically occur in school and the students are more focused on their iPad screens," Ms. Wong said.

#### Students Learn about Animal Evolution in Virtual Labs

In a virtual lab, students in Jessica Loprieno's science class are learning first-hand about the repercussions of England's Industrial Revolution on the evolution of animals. They have been using Gizmos – an interactive online simulation used for learning math and science.

Recently, seventh graders worked on their Natural Selection Gizmo program in which they pretended to be birds flying between trees while hunting for dark and light-colored moths.

"Students observed moth populations go up and down based on how well they were camouflaged with their environment and which populations were easy to spot and 'eat'," Ms. Loprieno said.

Students drew conclusions that in a forest of light-colored trees the dark moth population would decline as they were all eaten by the birds, and the opposite was true in a forest of dark colored trees. After participating in the virtual lab on their own, students went over the data, concepts and conclusions that they collected from the Gizmo program and shared them with their teams.

According to seventh grader Mia Willey, doing virtual labs is a very different experience compared to what she usually does in front of science class. It's nice to do a virtual lab for once instead of always doing worksheets and annotations like I usually do," she said.

### Marine Biology Students at Briarcliff High School are Learning About the Impact of Overfishing

Missing fins and broken skeletons are, sadly, among the consequences of overfishing. The students at Karla Constantinou's Marine Biology class at Briarcliff High School have been learning about this from an educator in Texas via virtual lessons.

"I was able to share my screen with my Marine Biology students and connect via Zoom so that all the students could see and interact with an educator with a sea turtle rescue organization in South Padre Island in Texas," said Ms. Constantinou.

One of the students' recent lessons was about the rescue and rehabilitation of injured sea turtles and relates to their unit on the Human Impact on the Oceans.

"Sea turtles often get caught up in fishing lines or trawling nets and because they breathe air, they usually die as bycatch (unintentionally caught species) by the time the fishermen pull in the long line or trawling net," Ms. Constantinou explained.

The other two topics in the unit are climate change and pollution, the latter of which the students are currently studying.
