# Message from District Leadership

Dear Briarcliff UFSD Families:

This past year has been particularly challenging for kids, families and our schools. It also has been quite revealing about who we are as a school community. Despite the confusion, fear and hardship brought about by the global pandemic, our District remained open the entire school year, our students engaged in academic and co-curricular pursuits, were supported through their troubles and found joy in the simple pleasures of togetherness. That is why it is with renewed optimism that we look forward to the future of our schools. Therefore, it is with great anticipation that we may now turn our focus to and prepare for the opportunities that await students next fall.

In collaboration with the Board of Education, the District's leadership team has developed a budget plan that reflects epidemiologic and economic realities as well as our educational imperatives. Together with input and feedback from the community, the Board of Education has adopted a budget that will support an overarching educational program that aligns with the values and aspirations of our school community. The proposed budget would allow the District to preserve and expand upon our educational programs and supports, address critical security and facilities' needs, and provide the financial flexibility necessary for the District to respond to potential demands and disruptions that the COVID-19 crisis may yet have in store for students, families and our schools.

The Briarcliff Schools continue to garner acclaim and recognition. Briarcliff High School was recently named the #1 high school program in Westchester County and has been nominated as a National Blue-Ribbon School of Distinction. Briarcliff Middle School has been nominated as an Apple School of Distinction. And Todd Elementary School was recently credited as one of only two elementary schools across the region to provide in-person learning for the entire 2020-2021 school year. This is possible because, regardless of the circumstances outside of our schools, staff worked diligently to ensure that students were inspired and engaged each and every day. Thank you for your support along the way. With your help, the District will continue to provide a broad array of educational activities and a warm, supportive and joyful environment for students to learn and to grow.

The Briarcliff Manor School District has a long-established tradition of excellence. The proposed budget would ensure that our students continue to be engaged, challenged, supported and prepared to meet

the challenges of the 21st century. Working closely with our building principals to address the goals and priorities of each of the three schools while maintaining our overarching district philosophy, the Board of Education is presenting a budget that provides for:

- Continued implementation of the new writing program as well as the exploration and hopeful adoption of a new reading program at Todd Elementary School.
- New engaging reading materials and expanded classroom libraries K-8.
- Adoption of a new hands-on districtwide engineering program.
- Increased social and emotional supports and training for middle and high school students and staff.
- Implementation of critical safety and security upgrades at all three schools.
- Maintenance, repair and replacement of important infrastructure and facility items.
- Updated furniture for several elementary, middle and high school classrooms.

Working below the New York State mandated tax levy limit, the Board of Education has adopted a budget of \$53,692,283 which represents a budget-to-budget increase of 0.58%. The budget vote will take place on Tuesday, May 18. Don't forget to exercise your civic responsibility and vote!

In addition to the information provided in this newsletter, the District has created a more detailed Budget Book for your perusal. This resource represents the District's commitment to working collaboratively with the Board of Education, the community, and staff in developing the proposed school budget. 



### **Briarcliff Middle School**

- BMS was honored with a nomination as an Apple Designated School. This nomination reflects the high percentage of faculty that trained to be Apple Certified Teachers and the innovation that our teachers have brought into their classrooms.
- The Annual Briarcliff Middle School Art Show was online this year and showcased more than 100 images of incredible artwork created by students across all grade levels. It was the largest show with the library to date.
- · Ten members of the BMS Math Club participated in the regional MATHCOUNTS competition. The top scorers were: Mia Willey, Riya Raina and Ava Wu with an identical score of 38 out of 46. They rank, respectively, number 27, 28, and 29 among 109 participants from Westchester and Putnam counties. Matt Epstein took fourth place on the team with a score of 31 and a rank of 57. # **Briarcliff Turns to Voters for District Improvements**

Alongside the Annual Budget Vote, voters in the Briarcliff Manor Union Free School District will weigh in on a \$26.6 million capital project proposal (Proposition 2 on the ballot) when they head to the polls on May 18th. The proposal addresses major infrastructure needs in all three of the school buildings and enhances instructional spaces at the high school.

Replacing leaking roofs as well as faulty HVAC plumbing and electrical systems were quickly identified as top priorities by the Facilities Planning Committee, which worked side by side with BBS Architects over the course of more than one year. The committee also agreed with Superintendent James Kaishian that converting outdated spaces into a 21st Century "Learning Exchange" at Briarcliff High School was a crucial investment. More than two-thirds of the project would be infrastructure-related and one-third would go to upgrading educational spaces.

The investments can be made without any increase in the tax levy.

"The ROI (return on investment) would be manifold," said Dr. Kaishian. "The project would ensure our facilities remain safe, clean and efficient, that our educational spaces are better aligned with current instructional practices and it would make our high school a more attractive destination to the 80 to 100 tuition paying students the District receives each year."

In its desire to promote a fiscally responsible capital plan, the District's Facilities Planning Committee developed an approach that should not cause an increase in the tax levy or the amount to be raised by taxes. That is because new borrowing will be timed to take effect as old loans for previous projects are being paid off. Costs would also be offset by state aid estimated to cover up to 30% of capital improvement project expenses.

While the voters of Briarcliff have passed smaller bond propositions in recent years, the last significant improvement plan for the District's school buildings was approved more than 20 years ago and did not include the spaces currently under consideration. The proposed project provides tremendous opportunities for students and teachers while addressing the safety and infrastructure needs of the District.


